## Speaker biographies

### **Dr Shams Duja**

I am Consultant Physician and Geriatrician at Dudley Group of Hospitals. My special interest is Movement Disorders. I am Parkinson's Excellence Network Lead for the West Midlands. As Care of the Elderly Department Lead at Dudley Group of Hospitals, I have been leading the Frailty in West Midlands Frailty Collaborative Group at different platforms. I am working closely with NHSE and NHSI to improve Frailty services in the region. Currently I am representing our trust in the development of MCP.

## Focus on Frailty

Hospitals all over the UK are struggling at the front door and majority of patients attending ED are frail elderly patients. There is focus on recognising Frailty and providing Comprehensive Geriatrics Assessments to these patients to improve there quality of care and quality of life. We opened Frailty Assessment Unit in ED and are achieving 75%+ discharges same day with all patients having CGA.

#### Dr Owen David

I was attracted to England's most beautiful shire four years ago to find spectacular scenery, good grammar schools and a plethora of outdoor activities. More than that, the welcome at Shrewsbury and Telford Hospitals was akin to joining a broad family, supportive and offering opportunities. One of those was the chance to take on the informal role of being the trusts Adult Lead for Adults with Learning Difficulties. As a Geriatrician our skill set allow us easily to take on such additional roles if it feels right and above all interesting. Having met and helped the Adults from Unit 18 I can also say it was fun. #### **Dr Thomas Jackson**

Dr Jackson currently works as a clinical academic geriatrician in the Institute of Inflammation and Ageing at the University of Birmingham.

His research interests include the immune-inflammatory basis of delirium, and how this impacts on the development of longer term cognitive outcomes, as well as work understanding how our ageing immune system may drive frailty and sarcopenia. His PhD was on pragmatic methods to identify dementia in older people with delirium and the affects of clinical subtypes and inflammatory profiles of delirium on outcomes. He is lead for Geriatric Medicine teaching across disciplines at the Medical and Dental School.

Clinically he works as a consultant orthogeriatrician at the Queen Elizabeth Hospital, Birmingham. He also regularly contributes to the unselected general medicine admissions take.
