
Samantha Riley

Director of Making Data Count, National Team for Intensive Support, Chief Operating Officer Directorate, NHS England

Samantha has worked for the NHS for over 20 years holding a variety of improvement-focused roles in different areas of the health sector including leading a system-wide improvement program in West London, undertaking a national improvement role with the Modernisation Agency, leading the national roll out of the Friends and Family Test and establishing the South East Coast Quality Observatory.

Samantha is passionate about the utilisation of data and information to support improvements in patient care and is a self-confessed 'information junkie'. In particular, Samantha is a proponent of using Statistical Process Control (SPC) to look at data rather than two point comparisons and Red Amber Green (RAG). Samantha is the author of the highly successful guides Making Data Count and over the past three years has undertaken a considerable amount of work with Trust boards to help them understand how to use data to better effect. As a result of this work, 100% of boards have made the decision to move away from RAG reporting and adopted SPC as their preferred approach.

Samantha has a large collection of techie SPC books, sunglasses and an impressive shoe collection.



Marjory Warren Guest Lecturer Professor David Oliver

Consultant Geriatrician and General Physician Royal Berkshire NHS Foundation Trust

Professor David Oliver is a Consultant in Geriatrics and General Internal Medicine, former clinical vice president of the Royal College of Physicians (RCP) and a Past President of the British Geriatrics Society having also been its Honorary Secretary.

In 2022, he became President Elect of the RCP and would have been the first geriatrician to take up this post. As a result of illness,



he no longer felt able to take up the post and is back to his first love of being a jobbing doctor on the wards and on the acute medical unit

David is a visiting fellow at the King's Fund, alongside his clinical job as an NHS consultant in geriatrics and general internal medicine at the Royal Berkshire NHS Foundation Trust, where he was also lead clinician and clinical director.

A hospital doctor since 1989, David was a consultant and clinical director at South London NHS Trust from 1998 to 2004 and was the Department of Health national clinical director for older people from 2009 to 2013. He has just finished 3 years as specialist clinical adviser for the NHS Emergency Care Improvement Partnership, visiting and working with over 30 acute hospitals and healthcare systems.

David has written a weekly freelance column, 'Acute perspective' in the BMJ, which has been shortlisted for the 2017 PPA columnist of the year award. He has written for several other professional and general publications. Although he is now longer an active academic researcher, he has published numerous academic research papers, reviews, book chapters, abstracts and editorials. In addition to his medical qualifications and research doctorate, David has master's degrees in health leadership, healthcare ethics and law, and postgraduate diplomas in health service management and medical education. He has been named in the Health Service Journal's top 100 clinical leaders lists.

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
